CRIME WATCH-MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

Crime continues to be the number one concern in most subdivisions including ours. Crimes in the Clayton Subdivision, that are reported to the Harris County Sheriff's Department, can be found at www.CrimeReports.Com. Daily email alerts can be set -up.

Five crimes were reported to the Sheriff's Department during the month of May, 2012. None of the crimes

involved homes being broken into or cars being stolen. Fewer crimes were reported in Clayton for the month of May than is normal and compared to surrounding subdivisions.

Area Crime Watch Coordinators share information such as the description of a person or vehicle so that citizens and subdivision patrol officers can be on the look out for suspicious individuals who go from subdivision to subdivision committing crimes.

Conserve water with rain barrels

In 2011, Texas endured the worst oneyear drought in its history. Suddenly, individuals who had never been very concerned with conservation were directly impacted as cities and MUDs enforced water restrictions. To make matters worse, according to an article in the Houston Chronicle, climate experts from Columbia University predict continuing and intensifying drought conditions. What does that mean for local homeowners besides higher water bills and renewed restrictions? It means water conservation is more important than ever. One easy way to get involved is by purchasing or making your own rain barrel.

WHAT IS A RAIN BARREL? A rain barrel is a container that collects and stores rainwater from downspouts and rooftops for future use watering lawns and gardens.

During the summer months it is estimated that nearly 40 percent of household water is used for lawn and garden maintenance. A rain barrel collects water and stores it for those times that you need it most — during the dry summer months. Using rain barrels potentially helps homeowners lower water bills, while also improving the vitality of plants, flowers, trees, and lawns.

Rain is naturally soft and devoid of minerals, chlorine, fluoride, and other harmful chemicals. The chemicals and hard water from many of our municipal water systems can add to chemical imbalances in soil and damage sensitive plants. Water collected from the roofs of houses picks up very little contamination, and is very healthy for plant life.¹

A quick search of the internet will lead the do-it-yourselfer to various designs for building a rain barrel or to multiple websites where they can be purchased. Most barrels are designed with screens to keep out debris and insects and hold from 40 - 100 gallons of water. Regardless of where you get your rain barrel or which design you choose, it is certain to have a positive impact on both your lawn and your pocket book.

For southern grasses including: St. Augustine, Bermuda and Zoysia.

FERTILIZE - four times a year: <u>Late June-Early July.</u> Apply slow-release 3-1-2 ratio fertilizers. (recommended formulations 19-5 -9, 19-4-10, 18-4-6, 15-5-10.)

- I/2 cup flour
- I/4 cup salt
- I/2 cup water
- 1/2 tablespoon oil
- 1/2 tsp cream of tartar

Mix all but the last ingredient in a small saucepan. Cook over a very low heat until it turns into a dough (it'll take just a few minutes). Knead the dough on a floured surface until cool enough for kids to touch. Separate the dough into as many colors as you want to make. Put just a few drops of coloring in each ball and knead until evenly mixed.
